This interdisciplinary Conference addresses the impact of the First Vatican Council (1869/70) on the churches in the context of the rise of nationalism. The immediate aftermath of the Council and the years leading up to the First World War proved some of the most formative in the realignment of Christianity across Europe and the wider world with the consolidation of the Old Catholic Movement as well as new ecumenical initiatives from the Orthodox, Anglican and Protestant Churches. There are four key themes:

- (1) the relationship of churches to national movements across Europe and worldwide and how churches responded to the creation of unified nation states;
- (2) the impact of Ultramontanism and Anti-Roman Catholicism in Rome, in Europe and worldwide as well as in the formation of new ecclesial movements and ideals;
- (3) the reshaping of ecumenical relations through such initiatives as the Bonn Conferences of 1874 and 1875;
- (4) the role of women during the council and in its aftermath.
